John Bartram, an unschooled colonial farmer during the early 18th century in Philadelphia, became a respected botanist and international plant entrepreneur. His plant finds, on expeditions from Canada to Florida, transformed 18th century gardens. Bartram is considered by many to be the "Father of American Botany". His endeavors led to a transformation of English gardens in the 18th century. His eight acre garden outside Philadelphia, is a National Historic Landmark.
